Statutory Authority

- The Advisory Council on Quality is authorized in accordance with the New Mexico Developmental Disabilities Act of 2017 (Section 28-16A-13 NMSA 2017) (C.3). "The department shall... convene and maintain a family infant toddler inter-agency coordinating council and a statewide adult support and services task force that shall, at a minimum, address quality assurance."
- Centers for Medicaid and Medicare Services (CMS)
 Waiver Applications (7/1/2021, p. 199) (included for all DD waivers)
 - "The Advisory Council on Quality Supports for Individuals with Developmental Disabilities and their Families (ACQ) is also statutorily required to advise the DOH on policy related to the programs administered by DOH. The ACQ meets regularly and is comprised of waiver stakeholders, which can include individual participants and their families."



Mission and Vision

Mission: The Advisory Council advises the New Mexico Department of Health on the systems guiding the provision of services and supports that assist people with Intellectual/Developmental Disabilities (I/DD) of all ages to be fully included in New Mexico communities

Vision: People with I/DD of all ages receive the supports and services needed to live inclusively and as independently as possible within their community



Values

- <u>Families and Support Networks:</u> In order to maximize their rights in receiving and accessing services and being fully included in their communities, individuals with I/DD count on families and natural support networks.
- <u>Community Inclusion:</u> People with I/DD of all ages are fully included in community life, are able to secure and maintain naturally occurring support, and are able to rely upon services and supports that enhance life choices in relationships, school, work, where to live and how to participate in community;
- Everyone is Valued: People with I/DD have gifts and strengths and are valued members of New Mexico communities;
- <u>Self-Determination:</u> People with I/DD have the freedom to make life choices, are able to self-direct supports and services, have access to the information necessary to make informed decisions regarding available supports and services, and are accountable and responsible for their choices and decisions;
- Respect: The diversity, culture, differences, history and privacy of people with I/DD are respected;
- Quality of Life: Quality of life is individually determined by persons with I/DD;
- Quality of Services: Good quality services and supports are readily available, adequate and appropriate, ethical, person-centered and holistic;
- <u>Dignity of Risk:</u> People with I/DD, together with their support network and families can determine how they want to balance safety with the opportunities they wish to pursue. Regulation and monitoring should be utilized to ensure the safety of people with I/DD, not be intrusive and should not deter people and their support networks from deciding how they will balance safety and opportunity; and
- <u>Support Networks:</u> Those providing supports and services respect the choices and the self-direction of people with I/DD. Providers of supports and services are respected for the good work they do.



Purpose of the ACQ

 The purpose of the Advisory Council is to provide advisory counsel to the Department with regard to the needs of people with I/DD.



Membership

- The Advisory Council shall consist of a minimum of fifteen (15) voting members with a maximum of thirty-six (36) members and have seventeen be either family members or individuals with disabilities.
- Over 50% of the ACQ shall consist of individuals with disabilities and family members.

Voting Members

- Fifteen People with I/DD and members of their families –
 Individuals with a diagnosis, either in childhood or
 adulthood, of an intellectual or developmental disability or
 family members or family guardians. One member shall
 receive services at an Intermediate Care Facility/IDD.
- Three Direct Support Professionals Individuals who work hands-on directly with individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities who are NOT therapists, consultants, family members or case managers.
- Ten Providers of Services –The following categories are required: At least one case manager, one therapist, one behavior support consultant and one representative of an Intermediate Care Facility/IDD



Voting Members

- Two Self Advocacy Organizations and networks Organizations or networks where the majority of the membership includes individuals with disabilities and the primary goal is to advocate for the needs and wants of individuals with I/DD.
- Three Advocacy Organizations and networks Organizations who do NOT provide services to people with disabilities and whose primary goal is to represent the interests of people with I/DD and their family members either as individuals or as a group of individuals.
- One designee of the Family Infant Toddler Interagency Coordinating Council as appointed by the membership of the Family Infant Toddler Interagency Coordinating Council;
- One designee of the Mi Via Advisory Committee as appointed by the membership of the Mi Via Advisory Committee; and
- One designee of the Medically Fragile Waiver Family Advisory Board as appointed by the membership of the committee Medically Fragile Waiver Family Advisory Board

Officers - Co-Chairs

- Elected for a two (2) year term and can serve a maximum of two (2) consecutive terms
- At least one co-chair shall be an individual with intellectual/developmental disability or a parent or family member
- Daniel Ekman and Lisa Blue are serving the end of their 2 terms and new co-chairs will be elected at the April 8, 2024 ACQ meeting.

Duties of the ACQ

- Conduct meetings every other month.
- Advise and assist the Department in reviewing outcomes regarding the quality assurance system for people with I/DD and their support networks.
- Provide information and feedback about service availability and current needs with regard to people with I/DD and their support networks.
- Participate in any statewide needs assessment processes.
- Recommend priorities for the development, modification, and expansion of services to meet the needs of people with I/DD.



Duties of the ACQ

- Advise and assist the Division in planning for services to people with I/DD.
- Promote collaboration efforts among state agencies and communitybased programs serving people with I/DD.
- Advocate for system change to improve on the quality of services addressing the specialized and individual needs of people with I/DD; and
- Advise the Division on policy changes and policy development.

Attendance

- The members shall notify a co-chair or the designated Division secretary/administrative assistant when unable to attend a scheduled Advisory Council meeting prior to the meeting time, in order to be excused from the meeting.
- Any member who misses three unexcused, consecutive, regularly scheduled meetings may be removed from membership.
- The Director of the Division, and as appropriate, other representatives from the key organizational units within the Department will be routinely invited to Advisory Council meetings.

Designees

- When unable to attend an Advisory Council meeting, a member may assign a designee to attend the meeting and represent the member.
- Notice of designee assignment shall be presented to the cochairs prior to the meeting.
 The Advisory Council shall recognize the designee as authorized to speak, including the right to vote, on behalf of the Advisory Council member.

Meetings

- The Advisory Council on Quality shall meet every other month and at other times as deemed necessary by the Division Director and/or the Advisory Council on Quality co-chairs.
- 2nd Thursday of every other month (February, April, June, August, October, & December)
- Currently meets via Zoom from 9:00 am until about 1:00 pm

ACQ Meeting Format

- ACQ members only are invited to speak during the ACQ meetings.
- Everyone is invited and encouraged to speak during the public comment period.
- The ACQ Exec. Comm. initiated Listening Sessions to meet the need for everyone to be able to discuss their concerns/recommendations/input, etc. in an ongoing format.

ACQ Executive Committee Listening Sessions

- The listening sessions are hosted bi-monthly, in between the regularly schedule bi- monthly ACQ meetings.
- These meetings are open to everyone and everyone in attendance is invited to speak.
- The purpose of these sessions is for people to share thoughts/ideas on how to improve the ACQ meetings and the NM DD system.



Committees

Standing Committees

There shall be six (6) standing committees:

The Executive Committee, the Policy and Quality Committee, the Nominating Committee, the By-Laws Committee, the Mi Via Advisory Committee, the Family Advisory Board, and other sub-committees or workgroups as determined by the Advisory Council membership

Executive Committee

- Develops the agenda for ACQ meetings
- Composed of the Co-Chairs, the Co-Chairs-elect (if applicable), the Division Director or designee, and two (2) members from the Advisory Council atlarge
- At-large member(s): Tracy Perry and Siri Guru Nam Khalsa
- DDSD Designee: Scott Doan
- Meets two weeks before every ACQ meeting and one week after every ACQ meeting.

Developmental Disabilities System Quality Improvement Committee (DDSQI)

- The DDSQI committee was established to drive effective management practices at DDSD and DHI that lead to sustained improvement in the programs for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities operated by DOH.
- DDSQI Structure and Membership:
 - DDSD and DHI Division Directors (Co-Chairs)
 - DDSD and DHI Deputies
 - DHI IMB and QMB Bureau Chiefs
 - DDSD Bureau of Systems Improvement Bureau Chief
 - HSD Deputy Director and Exempt Services Bureau Chief
- Meets the first Thursday of each month to review program quality improvement data, receive and act on systemic issues identified, track and analyze provider performance data, etc.





Human Services Department/Medical Assistance Division

HSD Mission and Vision

Misson: We ensure New Mexicans attain their highest level of health by providing whole-person, cost-effective, accessible, and high-quality health care and safety net services.

<u>Vision</u>: Every New Mexican has access to affordable health care coverage through a coordinated and seamless health care system

New Mexico Turquoise Care

- Turquoise Care is the new name for the New Mexico Medicaid Managed Care program that will begin on July 1, 2024. Turquoise Care services are provided through Managed Care Organizations (MCOs). Blue Cross Blue Shield, Molina Healthcare, Presbyterian Health Plan, and United Healthcare.
- Covered services include physical health (medical, dental, and vision), behavioral health (to help with issues such as stress, depression, anxiety, and addictions), longterm care, and Community Benefit (services like adult day health, respite care and personal care services).



- Turquoise Care Members receive an initial Health Risk Assessment (HRA) to obtain basic health and demographic information and determine the need for a Comprehensive Needs Assessment (CNA).
- Members may be assigned to a care coordinator or request one, should they need additional assistance.
- A care coordinator is someone who looks at a Member's physical and/or behavioral health needs and works directly with the Member and their family to get the services the Member needs. These services may include housing, transportation, employment, financial assistance and connecting with community resources.
- Community Benefit is an option for Members who meet a nursing facility level of care, meaning they need assistance with activities such as dressing, bathing, brushing teeth, toileting, etc. Services like adult day health, personal care services, and respite care are included in this option.
- Community Benefit is available for people on the DD Wait List, whereby the Member works with their MCO to access home and community-based services while waiting for the DD Waiver or Mi Via.



Programs for Individuals with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities

Home and Community Based Waiver Eligibility Definition; Effective 10/1/2020

Developmental disabilities waiver services are intended for eligible recipients who have developmental disabilities limited to intellectual disability (ID) or a related condition as determined by DOH/DDSD.

Developmental Disabilities Waiver (DDW) or Traditional Waiver

The Developmental Disabilities (DD) Waiver program also known in New Mexico as the "traditional DD waiver" is designed to provide Services and Supports that assist eligible children and adults with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (IDD) to participate as active members of their communities. The DD Waiver is one of several waivers available in New Mexico. The program serves as an alternative to institutional care.



Mi Via Waiver or Self-Directed Waiver

Mi Via, which means 'my path,' 'my way,' or 'my road,' is New Mexico's Medicaid self-directed home and community-based services (HCBS) waiver program. Mi Via is the result of the efforts of many individuals and groups state-wide, starting in 1999, to realize the inclusion of self-direction as an option in New Mexico's HCBS waivers. Mi Via is intended to provide a community-based alternative to institutional care that facilitates greater participant choice, direction and control over services and supports. Mi Via is about choosing self-direction over your home and community-based services, support and goods within your approved plan and budget.



Medically Fragile Waiver

The Medically Fragile Waiver (MFW) program is intended for individuals who have been determined to have both a medically fragile condition and a developmental disability to live in their homes. The Medically Fragile Waiver Program provides case management (by Registered Nurses only), private duty nursing (RN & LPN), home health aides, physical therapy, speech therapy, occupational therapy, psychosocial counseling, nutritional counseling and specialized medical equipment.



Supports Waiver

New Mexico's Supports Waiver is a Home and Community Based Services (HCBS) waiver that is designed to provide an option for support to individuals who are on the Developmental Disabilities (DD) Waiver Wait List. Supports Waiver services are intended to complement unpaid supports that are provided to individuals by family and others. Supports Waiver services are not intended to, nor do they provide twenty-four (24) hour paid supports.

State General Funds

The State General Fund (SGF) program offers through provider agreements with the Developmental Disabilities Supports Division of the Department of Health. The following services are offered through the SGF program.

- Adult Residential Services
 - Not a 24/7 service.
 - For individuals 22 and older (changing to 18 and over).
- Day Services
 - For individuals 22 and older (changing to 18 and over).
 - Community Inclusion and Employment supports and services
- Respite Services
- SGF services are not available to those individuals who are receiving Home and Community Based Waiver services.
