

The Child Care Assistance Program subsidizes the cost of child care for families at or below 400% of the federal poverty level that are working, in school, or searching for employment.

New Mexico PreK is a free, voluntary program that equips 3- and 4-year-old children with the early literacy, math, and social-emotional skills they will need to enter Kindergarten ready to thrive. NM PreK is available in both school and community-based settings.



NEW MEXICO EARLY HEAD START/HEAD START

Early Head Start/Head Start is a federally funded program supporting children's success through early learning, health, and family well-being services. The program provides early screenings, nutritious meals, and referrals to community resources while engaging parents as active partners.



FAMILY INFANT TODDLER (FIT)

FIT provides early intervention services to children from birth to age 3 who have a developmental delay or disability or who are at-risk of developing a delay.

HOME VISITING

Home Visiting is a free program for all New Mexico families with children prenatal through age 5, offering in-home support from experts on safe sleep, postpartum care, nutrition, child care, breastfeeding, and more.

FAMILIES FIRST



Families FIRST is a state program, which provides free case management services and offers a go-to support system during pregnancy, infancy, and throughout the first three years of a child's life for Medicaid-eligible families. Registered nurses across the state, are just a phone call away to provide education, resources, and support on pregnancy, health, nutrition, and nurturing.

FOOD AND NUTRITION

The Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) provides reimbursement to child care providers, child care centers, Head Start programs, afterschool programs, and emergency shelters for nutritious meals and snacks. The Summer Food Service Program (SFSP), partners with community organizations to feed children during the summer.
