IN THE SUPREME COURT OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO 1 2 **April 8, 2022** 3 No. 22-8100 4 IN THE MATTER OF THE 5 **ESTABLISHMENT OF THE** 6 **NEW MEXICO SUPREME COURT** 7 **COMMISSION ON MENTAL** HEALTH AND COMPETENCY 8 10 **ORDER** WHEREAS, this matter having come before the Court on recommendation 11 from the Mental Health and Competency Steering Committee to create the New 12 Mexico Supreme Court Commission on Mental Health and Competency with a 13 mission to improve access to the justice system and treatment services based on an 14 15 individual's mental health status; WHEREAS, the Commission's objectives shall be to promote fair treatment 16 of affected individuals, to improve public safety through appropriate and meaningful 17 behavioral health interventions, and to provide proper education and training to 18 judges, lawyers, court staff, and cross-system partners at the intersection of 19 20 behavioral health and criminal justice;

WHEREAS, the Commission will seek to achieve its objectives through the

1. Using the collective knowledge of its members to recommend system-wide responses to justice-involved persons with mental illness, specifically those policies related to competency to stand trial; to ensure timely identification of adults and juveniles in need of mental health treatment early in the process; and to ensure the referral, when necessary, of individuals with mental health needs to appropriate services for community-based treatment;

- Advancing intergovernmental communication and cross-system collaboration to reduce barriers to proper mental and behavioral health care while in the justice system and to ensure proper communication of necessary data to direct appropriate solutions while protecting privacy; and
- 3. Improving the allocation of resources, particularly to underresourced rural and urban communities, in recognition of New Mexico's diversity of large populated and smaller communities, including New Mexico's sovereign tribal nations;

WHEREAS, mental health is a state of well-being in which an individual realizes the individual's own abilities, can cope with the stresses of life, can work productively, and is able to make a contribution to the community;

WHEREAS, the promotion, protection, and restoration of mental health is a vital concern of communities throughout New Mexico because mental health is fundamental to the collective and individual ability to think, emote, interact with others, earn a living, and enjoy meaningful lives;

WHEREAS, the Court having considered the foregoing and being sufficiently advised, Chief Justice Michael E. Vigil, Justice C. Shannon Bacon, Justice David K. Thomson, Justice Julie J. Vargas, and Justice Briana H. Zamora concurring;

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS ORDERED that the New Mexico Supreme Court Commission on Mental Health and Competency IS HEREBY ESTABLISHED as a permanent standing commission of this Court.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the membership and Chair of the Commission shall be appointed by the Court and shall be comprised of the following representation.

- A. Voting Members. Voting members shall include the following:
 - 1. Two (2) judges from larger urban jurisdictions;
 - 2. One (1) judge from a medium-sized jurisdiction;
 - 3. Two (2) judges from smaller rural jurisdictions;
 - 4. One (1) behavioral health advocate;
 - 5. One (1) community member with life experience pertinent to issues surrounding mental health;

- 6. One (1) supportive housing advocate;
- 7. One (1) tribal member, preferably one that works for Indian Health Services, a tribal behavioral health provider, or otherwise within a behavioral health system;
- 8. One (1) prosecutor with experience working with the courts regarding behavioral health;
- 9. One (1) criminal defense attorney with experience working with the courts regarding behavioral health;
- 10. One (1) attorney with significant experience in mental health or disability law;
- 11. One (1) legislative member;
- 12. One (1) member of local law enforcement;
- 13. One (1) designee from the executive branch; and
- 14. Two (2) at-large members.
- B. Terms of appointment. Voting members shall be appointed for staggered three (3)-year membership terms. Members who are initially assigned a one (1) or two (2)-year term, or who are appointed to complete the remainder of an unexpired term of a prior member, may be reappointed to two (2) full three (3)-year terms thereafter. No standing committee

- member shall serve for more than two (2) full three (3)-year terms unless ordered by the Court.
- C. Children's Court Judge. At least one of the voting member judges must be actively presiding over cases in the Children's Court or have significant experience presiding over cases in the Children's Court.
- D. Participation required. Voting members must actively participate in the general meetings, actively participate in at least one subcommittee, and actively contribute to the work of the commission. The missing of two consecutive meetings without cause may result in removal from the Commission.
- E. Ex-Officio Participation. The Commission shall encourage and invite non-voting ex-officio representatives from the following entities and stakeholders to participate in the work of the Commission:
 - 1. New Mexico chapter of the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI);
 - New Mexico Human Services Department (HSD)
 Behavioral Health Collaborative and/or Local
 Collaborative(s);
 - 3. HSD Behavioral Health Services Division;

- 16. Representative with knowledge of grant funding for behavioral health;
- 17. Professional from emergency medicine field;
- 18. Professional provider of legal, intervention, and/or rehabilitation services for youthful offenders;
- 19. Disability rights advocacy organization; and
- 20. Law enforcement-affiliated crisis intervention or coresponder team.
- F. Staffing. The Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) Director or designee shall participate in committee meetings but shall not vote. The AOC Director or designee shall work with the chair of the Commission to ensure appropriate staff are assigned to assist the Commission and support the Commission's activities by scheduling meetings; preparing meeting and hearing materials; drafting minutes, committee reports, and written recommendations; performing research; and rendering other types of assistance as reasonably requested by the Committee.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the Court, in consultation with the Mental Health and Competency Steering Committee, will appoint voting members to reflect the diversity of our state and the objectives of the Commission.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the Court, in consultation with the Mental Health and Competency Steering Committee, will appoint the Chair of the Commission from among its voting members.

IT IS SO ORDERED.
